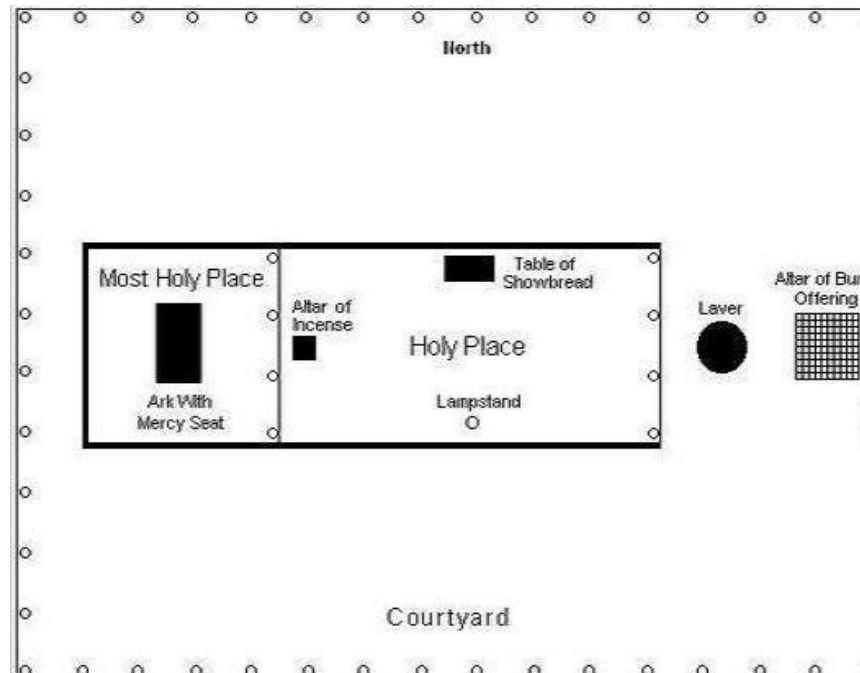

## The Tabernacle

"... the copy and shadow of heavenly things" - Hebrews 8:5

"And let them make me a sanctuary, that I may dwell in their midst. Exactly as I show you concerning the pattern of the tabernacle, and of all its furniture, so you shall make it." Ex. 25:8-9



"I have spoken by the prophets and have multiplied visions; I have given symbols through the witness of the prophets." (Hosea 12:10)

These are the materials that were used and what they may symbolize through Christ:

GOLD - Divine glory; royalty; deity	SILVER - redemption; blood	BRASS - fire, judgment
WOOD - humanity; the Cross	LINEN - holiness; priesthood	WHITE - purity; sinless
PURPLE - royalty	BLUE - heaven	SCARLET - blood
RAM SKIN - substitutionary sacrifice	GOAT HAIR - atonement	BADGER SKIN - protection

DOOR - one door; one way (John 10:9; 14:6)	OIL - Holy Spirit; anointed one (Luke 4:18)
LAMPSTAND - light (John 8:12)	BREAD - manna; living bread (John 6:33 - 58)
WATER - living water (John 7:37-38); baptism	INCENSE - priesthood; prayers (Rev. 8:3-4)

The TABERNACLE was a portable building that was constructed according to God's blueprint. He wanted to dwell among His people. The tabernacle is spoken of in over 50 chapters in the Bible, including 13 in Exodus, 18 in Leviticus, 2 in Deuteronomy and 4 in Hebrews. The TEMPLE was an amplified, permanent version. In the New Testament, Jesus became flesh and dwelt (lit. "tabernacled") among us (John 1:14). Now, as Christians, God dwells in us. Our bodies are the temple of the Holy Spirit (1 Corinthians 3:16; 6:19).
